"Maurice Pyle has been a full-time greenwood craftsman and teacher involved in a wide range of traditional woodland crafts in the north of England since the early nineties. He is also the founder of Woodsmith, a woodworking tool retailer.

We'll cover the bodging skills of timber selection, cleaving, trimming, and shaving using a few simple hand tools. These tools will include axes, froes, drawknives, and spokeshaves. Learn to use them correctly and safely, and if there is time, how to keep them sharp."

Swill Skills in Oak Basketry with Lorna Singleton





Oak basketry is a critically endangered craft with its historic hub in South Cumbria. You're invited to join Lorna, one of the very few remaining 'swillers' for a Weekend in the Woods.

""This course combines greenwood and basketry techniques (and fire!) to teach the basics of processing the wood and 2 beginner weaving patterns.

You'll learn:

To cleave a coppiced oak stem using wedges and a maul, and then a froe. How to boil the wood to a riving state, in my oil-drum boiler.

To rive the hot oak

To dress it to weaving quality using a knife or using a mare and drawknife

And learn weaving techniques to make two small baskets."

N.B. Boiling oak makes a black soup that can dye your hands and clothes so wear clothes you don't mind getting dyed!



Traditional Westmorland Panels with Sam Ansell



am will teach
the traditional

"Traditional Westmorland panels are beautiful, robust and compact panels made from woven Hazel with an Ash top and bottom rail.

We will be using basic greenwood techniques to build the framework, and then splitting, weaving and coaxing hazel to make the body of the panel.

Finished panels will be approximately 3ft by 3ft."

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Pole-lathe Bowl Turning with Shannon Berry



With evidence showing this craft was alive over 2,000 years ago Shannon is keen to share skills and knowledge about polelathe turning over Weekend in the Woods.

"Experience the heritage craft of pole-lathe turning from log to bowl. Immersing yourself in nature at every step of the process.

We will delve into detail about wood, cover tool technique and dip our toes into design.

Suited to all levels of experience. Please note for this type of turning we'll be using our legs to pump and arms for tool control. Similar energy as walking up a large hill and I will be there to help at each stage."



Leather Axe Sheath and Tool Belt Making with Tony Morgan

"Bring along your favourite axe and make a leather cover for it.

You'll learn to design a template, cut, oil and wax the leather, set rivets and press studs, and learn the saddle stitch for hand-sewing.

On the second day there may be time to make another axe sheath or a sturdy tool belt."

"The Lime Tree has an incredible history, often overlooked and yet quite simply inspiring.

During the course we will look at how to make simple cups/containers out of the bark, roll some high quality cordage referencing some of its historical uses and create a simple woven basket."

DURING THE WEEKEND

Registration will open at 8am alongside breakfast, opening talk around 9am with courses to start soon after.

It's a Weekend in the Woods tradition to have a fireside gathering on the Saturday night. Please bring your instruments, voices and anything else you might need!
